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# Growing Elder Population, Lack of Care———

We are currently in the midst

of an unusual restructuring of demographics. The Baby Boomers are one of the largest generations in history, and as they get older, they are causing the demographic makeup of the United States change drastically. According to the last census, there are 76.4 million Baby Boomers out of a total population of 318.9 million. You might assume that this rising need to elder care would cause a boom in the field of geriatric care. You would be wrong. Despite this huge increase in the aging

population, there are

very few doctors who

specialize in geriatrics. In fact, 97% of medical students never even take a course in geriatrics. This means that there is a whole generation of doctors who are not trained in the type of specialized care that many elders need. Recent studies show that good geriatric care can extend independent living, increase social and physical functioning,

lower prevalence of disease, decrease the amount of time that seniors spend in hospitals, and decrease the likelihood of depression.

> So why are there so few geriatric practitioners? The answer may lie in the fact that despite requiring huge amounts of technical expertise and years of

training, geriatricians are some of the lowest paid doctors in the field. It is simply not lucrative enough to attract enough doctors. However, with the growing proportion of senior citizens, there will be soon be a huge need for geriatricians. It is

essential that we have professionals fully that understand some of the specialized / care that our parents and grandparents are going need. Hopefully a new generation of

doctors will come to understand that helping the elderly is the wave of the future.

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
